Reports

Clergy

District Priest

One of the difficulties in writing a report about the preceding year is that in a year like the one just past so much has happened that it is difficult to keep up with all that is happened, so I apologise at the beginning for any omissions.

Our time period began with the laying up of Bishop John's pastoral staff and the search for his successor. Our small committee that was charged with the task of bringing a list of suitable candidates to the Electoral Synod. This was an intense time of interviews etc but was great to have the opportunity for Yorke Peninsula to have a say, with Robert Cook and Cheryl Bates also serving on this committee. The committee worked well and proposed three outstanding candidates from which Bishop Jeremy was chosen.

Not surprisingly, the absence of a bishop leaves a vacuum, and some ministry units became problematic. The Reverend Martin Bleby as administrator was principally engaged in the process of keeping the diocese running and this left the problems for the Archdeacons to deal with. Unfortunately, although there were three archdeacons at the beginning, two of these resigned and so I was left as the only archdeacon covering the whole diocese.

Following the installation of our new Bishop (February 25), my role changed. The principle need for the diocese was to ensure that the Bishop got up to speed as soon as possible – I was not advising the Bishop about decisions, but mainly providing background information of various situations. We are fortunate that our Bishop is a quick learner and the time commitment for this role is rapidly reducing. We also welcome the appointment of a second Archdeacon for Eyre which bodes well for the coming year.

I thank the graciousness of the Ministry District of Yorke Peninsula, enabling me to deal with the inevitable Spot Fires and the archdeaconry duties necessary over this period.

With regard to the Ministry District, we have had a reasonable year although sadly no real growth. Ardrossan, Corny Point, Curramulka, Maitland, and Warooka have reduced their scheduled Services – and a number of services have needed to be cancelled because of the absence of key people. This also includes working at Point Pearce as we have been forced out by an Adelaide Baptist group. Our church averages have actually held up pretty well considering the year has been characterised by the absence of various people taking post covid holidays. This would explain a lot of the decline in various places. The significance of these absences has been a lack of personnel for creating new programs although we have managed to maintain most programs from last year. It would be my hope that we can continue to find new ways to find new ways to engage the community.

The highlights of this last year were the Pancake Tea in Yorketown who are building up their clientele, Soup Lunches and Men's Breakfast bringing people from other churches as well as our own. Our Wednesday service has grown and those present enjoy a wonderful time of fellowship afterwards. We are continuing to prepare pre-recorded services each week and are gradually build a congregation on-line.

The Yorke Peninsula has already received two Episcopal Visits since February, from our new Bishop, Jeremy James tssf and a visit from Bishop David Nye Nye Niang from Mandalay. We were honoured to have Bishop Jeremy visit us on March 25/26 as part of his initial tour of his new diocese. We entertained him with a bring and share tea and then he celebrated and preached at a district service, both at St Benedict, Minlaton. The congregation then gathered at Watsacowie for a light lunch.

We were also part of Bishop David of Mandalay's tour of the Willochra Diocese. He visited every centre of the Ministry District with appropriate photos, and spoke to primary students at Yorketown Area School, both Stansbury and Curramulka Schools. A short video of the life of the boys at the Shwebo Orphanage made a huge impact on these children and teachers and reminded them of the advantages of life on the Yorke Peninsula. Bishop David also spoke at a welcome fellowship tea and at our Wednesday Eucharist and updated us on the current situation in Myanmar. Some of his flock have fled the military and are now living rough in the forests.

Bishop David invites us to pray for him and the church in Mandalay and continue with our financial support. We have sent some money towards the planned Girls Orphanage. A challenging project.

It is appropriate that I thank you for all your support. I especially thank Cheryl Bates our district chair who is also helping with some of the challenges around the place. For all our wardens, treasurers, secretaries and committee members — Thank you for your contributions. A special thank you for the LLM's who are keeping our services ticking over and The Reverend Christine Smith and The Reverend Louise Lang for their services. Also, for the support of our retired clergy the Reverend David Amery and the Reverend Ted Horne who have helped cover the services and the Aged Care Facilities. I am pleased that Mother Sorèl Coward has agreed to join as an Associate Priest to help us keep the number of services available.

There is much more to say, especially to thank you with your help and patience as I am dealing with significant family issues in Melbourne. I look forward to continuing to serve you as your district priest into the future.

District Deacon

I continue to serve as Pastoral Care Worker at both Curramulka Primary School and Yorketown Area School and serve on both schools Governing Councils. I have been reminded this year that in this work I am a representative of all the churches in our communities, and that all I do I represent you all. The PALMS (Play, Arts, Learning, Music & Story) playgroup that I coordinate has been going really well we have now had 100 children attend from over seventy families. It has been a great way to meet many young families in our wider community. I have also been working in both schools in the area of wellbeing and social and emotional support. I have been using the Kimochi program at Curramulka and working our way through Big Life Journals at both schools with the upper primaries. This year we have also started a breakfast program at YAS.

My work with Anglicare Willochra keeps me busy as we consider formulating a diocesan Reconciliation Action Plan, continue with my role on the Provincial Domestic and Family Violence Working Group, help with food assistance as required and helping lead a session at our recent Clergy Conference. I also attended the Anglicare Australia Conference in September last year.

On the first Sunday of the month, I have been leading the monthly 'Rejoyce' service at Minlaton, an inclusive service with a relaxed approach to our readings of the day. It is great to work with our local band, and to serve alongside Ted and the terrific St Benedict's LLMs – Jill, Robert and Bev. Up until recently I had been leading a service at Warooka on the second Sunday of the month. Other Sundays I am with Andrew assisting with those services.

I have been coordinating the local Coffee and Craft group and it has been good to see that group grow a little over the last twelve months. I also prepare most of the breakfast for the monthly men's breakfasts. I have continued to serve the Diocese as the Clerical secretary of Synod.

I look forward to continuing to work alongside you in our communities in this beautiful place!

In the past financial year the Ministry District Committee met Quarterly plus the AGM in August 2022 - at Minlaton.

These meetings provided a forum to canvass new ideas, review past achievements and begin to think of the possibilities for the future. In particular, more interaction with the people from Maitland, Point Pearce and Ardrossan and the smaller coastal communities to encourage cohesiveness and a sense of belonging.

The Covid-19 pandemic has impacted us all in various ways. We have become used to individual glasses for wine during communion. A return to the common cup may be possible in future.

Father Andrew Lang has continued to record services for replay on YouTube. Thanks go to all the people who willingly participate in those presentations.

In the absence of a bishop following Bishop John Stead's retirement in July last year much more responsibility for managing Diocesan issues fell to Fr Andrew as Archdeacon. This meant his time and resources were stretched to the limit. Those who have helped during this stressful time have been appreciated. Some Ministry District tasks were harder to maintain. The appointment of Reverend Mother Sorèl Coward as assistant priest has eased Fr Andrew's load somewhat. Those congregations who have been blessed with a service from Mother Sorèl have appreciated the sound presentation of God's message. Welcome and thank you Mother Sorèl.

Bishop Jeremy James was installed as bishop of Willochra early this year and has been welcomed by all.

"The Connection" has unfortunately not been produced regularly. It is a means of keeping the wider Anglican community members aware of our activities, concerns and achievements. Judicious editing of the quarterly reports sent to the Ministry District meetings would be appreciated by Fr Andrew when he is planning to produce an issue. Both the Yorketown Rectory and the Maitland Rectory are being treated well by the current tenants. Some serious maintenance issues remain at both sites.

Annual fire safety checks in all MD churches and associated buildings were done in October.

Jan Henery has been placing regular advertisements in the YPCT for Anglican Services and this continues to work well. Jan's diligence and efficiency are greatly appreciated.

The Flying Angel Centre in Edithburgh has been attended by seafarers following the pandemic only recently. June Harrison and her small team of volunteers have been welcoming crew members and transporting them to Edithburgh and Yorketown for recreation and shopping. Support from the wider Ministry District members would be gratefully received now that crews are able to get off their ships.

Our budgets are barely holding up at the moment and some centres are dipping into their reserves to meet their monthly payments. This is not a long term strategy. Supporting a full-time priest will require some creative thinking around fundraising into the future for most congregations. Centres with Op Shops seem to be managing their financial quotas. Other small centres relying on Sunday collection plate donations will need more support from the wider Ministry District.

Bruce Cook has retired as our MD treasurer. He has kept a steady hand on our finances for the past 21 years and has been Acting Treasurer for the past two years! I have made tentative enquiries with Withers Advisory that sounded encouraging and worth pursuing in more detail.

Thank you to Venerable Andrew Lang and Deacon Louise Lang, Reverend Mother Sorèl Coward, Reverend Christine Smith, Fr David Amery, Fr Ted Horne, and to all the LLM's who faithfully lead worship in various places when a priest cannot be present. Thank you too to the Committee members and the many others who keep our Ministry District and its churches in good spirit.

Bargains and Bits

The past twelve months have been very fruitful, financially. Shop sales were an all-time record, \$29,047.55. Thanks to everyone for facilitating this wonderful result. In May an executive decision was made to transfer \$5,000 to a Term Deposit account for 12 months to receive a better rate of interest.

Expenses this year have included \$634.40 to upgrade the switchboard in the Op shop, another step towards compliance with safety requirements. A welcome addition of a second air conditioner (\$1999) was fitted in the rear display room of the shop, increasing the comfort of customers and volunteers throughout the year.

Donations to Missions recommenced this year as planned, a total of \$5,750 assisted eleven groups. Monthly payments to St. Benedict's Church have continued and upon request increased to a total of \$18,000 for the financial year. Church finances are unlikely to improve in the near future, so the payments are unlikely to return to the previous amount of \$1,000 per month.

The recladding of the shop building last year has not only improved the appearance but also the durability of the building which was put to the test during strong winds this winter.

Two new volunteers have begun assisting in the shop this year, their presence is warmly received, and a librarian is now in control of our books. Due to various reasons including holidays and illness, our volunteer numbers have declined. An application has been made with Centrelink to be approved under the Voluntary Work programme to accept job seekers to assist in voluntary work either during preparation of donations for sale or selling items in the shop. I await a reply.

Once again, I wish to thank all volunteers and supporters of Bargains and Bits who assist in anyway, for their dedication throughout the year. A team effort is the reason for such a successful year.

In February we went to Primo at the Minlaton Hotel to celebrate Audrey Edwards 90th birthday with a meal and cake.



Mission to Seafarers - Port Giles/Edithburgh

I have much pleasure presenting this report for the year June 30th 2022 – July 1st 2023.



Sea Sunday, combined with our Port Giles MtS 10th anniversary [actually our 11th as Covid interrupted in 2022] was celebrated in July 2022 and Martyn Robinson gave an address and a 'Muse' on his book "Ships and Seafarers'. He generously donated books to our centre with all profits from their sale to go to our mission.

In October Geoff Harrison as a founding member and first Lay Chaplain of the Port Giles MtS was selected to plant a Golden Queen Holly to commemorate Queen Elizabeth's Platignum Jubilee.

Unfortunately Geoff died shortly afterwards in November. A framed photograph with dedication was later presented to June by Ray Agnew, our Chairman, who said it was to be placed in a prominent position in the FAC.

Ron Kandelaars from Channel 7 visited our centre and made a short documentary which was shown on National television in October.

I participated through Zoom in the MtS National Conference in November.

Christmas gifts and nibbles, together with Christmas cards and drawings from the community and preschool were given to crews who arrived over the Christmas season.

Since the reduction in Covid, seafarers gradually began accessing shore leave from the beginning of 2023 and the mission began slowly returning to pre Covid activities. The Flying Angel Centre's stocks had been depleted resulting in major restocking of supplies such as clothing, snacks, souvenirs, toiletries and health products.

Garry Dodd our Regional Director resigned and Sue Dight was elected in his position. In February Sue Dight visited our centre and met with the Committee. She was impressed with our Flying Angel Centre and



management. Sue presented June Harrison with a certificate in recognition of Geoff and June's work for the welfare of seafarers. It was signed by our Patron, Her Royal Highness Princess Anne.

Some seafarers like to spend quiet time in prayer in St Mary's church and two Filipino men shared in our Good Friday meditations.

Easter eggs and nibbles were given to seafarers who were in Port Giles over Easter.

A wreath to commemorate ANZAC Day was laid at the war memorial in Edithburgh. Ray Agnew, our Chairman, together with his granddaughter Mia, has made tins of ANZAC biscuits for most ships arriving in Port Giles . When available, fresh fruit and vegetables from local gardens was gratefully accepted by delighted crews.

With assistance from a grant from the AGL and Wattle Point Wind Farm Community Fund we purchased a commercial fridge. This has enabled chocolates and the like to be kept safe from mice and drinks to be kept cold.

Information sessions about the MtS and our work have been given to interested groups, including two Probus clubs and two SACWA groups

Providing shopping, sight seeing trips and visits to our FAC has one again become the norm for seafarers coming ashore. Exchanging the crews' American money for Australian has continued but we now have the problem of no local money exchange. The American cash has to be taken to Adelaide to be exchanged.

Bishop David from Myanmar visited the mission and was delighted with the facilities and our activites. From the selection of Bibles in foreign languages he found one in Burmese and inscribed it for us. He also presented us with a small framed picture of Jesus.

Mother Sorel, who at one stage was in the Navy, visited a ship with us after sharing in a church luncheon. She enjoyed sharing time with some crew and visiting the bridge.

Another guitar has been donated by Scott Harrison and he replaced strings on the existing guitars.

Our modem which has provided free internet connection to visitors to the centre had to be replaced. Unfortunately the new one is not working satisfactorily and we are investigating having NBN installed.

Go Talk which has provided sims and recharge for mobiles since we began the mission has now ceased working with mobile phones.

We have now obtained an Optus account and can provide seafarers with economical sims while making a small profit for our mission. Optus is a major supporter of the MtS.

We are very grateful for all donations of money and goods to the mission. We especially thank the ladies who make beanies, mittens and neck warmers.

I would like to express my great appreciation for everyone who supported the Mission, and me personally through the difficult Covid years and Geoff's illness and passing. I believe our mission is strong, with volunteers who have the seafarers' welfare at heart. I promised Geoff that as long as the Lord gives me good health and strength that I will devote myself to our MtS and the seafarers who arrive in Port Giles.
